European Commission Launches Two Formal Investigations Against IBM of Suspected Abuse of Dominant Market Position

Tampa, Florida July 26, 2010 – The European Commission announced today that it will begin two formal investigations against IBM in cases of alleged infringements of EU anti-trust laws related to the abuse of dominant market positions. One of these investigations relates to a complaint filed by T3T, Inc. with the commission in January, 2009.

“We applaud the EU Commission for taking formal action on the material issues raised in our complaint”, said Steven Friedman, President of T3T, Inc. “We’ve felt all along that through a prism of just the fact of our case, the commission and others, would find enough compelling documentation on IBM market abuses to warrant a complete investigation into IBM’s practices over the past decade. We’re hopeful that other judicial agencies will come to the same conclusion.”

T3 has previously filed an antitrust claim against IBM in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York alleging antitrust violations and unfair competition. That case was dismissed in September 2009 on a legal technicality and T3 is appealing.

T3’s complaints allege a history of IBM abusing its monopoly power in the mainframe industry. T3 accuses IBM of preventing the sales of competing mainframe hardware products by tying the sale of its operating system to its mainframe hardware, withholding patent licenses and certain intellectual property to the detriment of mainframe customers.
